AVIATION PIONEER ENJOYS FIRST TRANSCONTINENTAL AIR VOYAGE

The thrills of a transcontinental vacation trip by air have not yet ceased to stir the loquacious Mr. and Mrs. George E. Hallett, of Michigan road, who returned last night from a flight to California and return.

The trip was undertaken rather suddenly, although Mrs. Hallett, who was a pioneer aviator, had been dreaming of it for several years. Mr. Hallett, who is in the General Motors building, and said, "I would not you could get an air tour on the Fourth?" Mrs. Hallett recovered her breath and began to tell the story of her clothes were hastily thrown into a suitcase and preparations were made for the trip.

OF FOR California A tri-motor Fokker plane, of the Western Air Express, carried the Halletts to Los Angeles, 14,000 feet, an average altitude of 7,000 feet. The weather was very hot, it was always cool in the plane except when it landed at six points for refueling. Meals were served to the passengers on a tray, and every possible convenience was had in mind.

Mr. Hallett has a moving picture camera with him and took movies in Texas, Arizona and New Mexico. One of the highlights they saw in Texas was a cloud-burst in profile. They also saw the lightning, and below the clouds and rivers overflowing with water. They also saw movies of lava flows and a meteor shower in Arizona, and of the Mojave Desert. The Western Air Express voyagers could see the rim of the Grand Canyon, 60 miles away.

Mr. Hallett is an enthusiastic glider and is president of a gliding club, which meets almost every evening at the Schaefer airport. He believes it is an intensive way to learn to fly. Speaking of improvements of the road, construction during the past 20 years, he said that gliders are built more than ever before. The planes were then. In addition, the improved knowledge of engines, the instruments and the two-voice radio are great factors of convenience and safety.
