STRUCK BY CAR BOY INJURED

Driver Released After Making Statement To The Police

George McHugh, 16 years old, 1275 Webster avenue, received scalp wounds Saturday at 11:30 p. m. when he was run over by an automobile driven by Louis Rothberg, of Mt. Clemens, on Maple avenue at Edenhorough avenue. He was treated by Dr. F. F. Lawler.

According to a statement Mr. Rothberg made to the Birmingham Police department, McHugh and Douglas Lynch, 686 Chestnut street, were walking along Maple avenue pushing a motorcycle when he struck the boy. Rothberg said that he did not see the youth until he was too near them to avoid striking them. He was not held.

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STORM DAMAGES LIGHTING SYSTEM

Firemen Answer Two Alarms And Linemen Quickly Restore Service

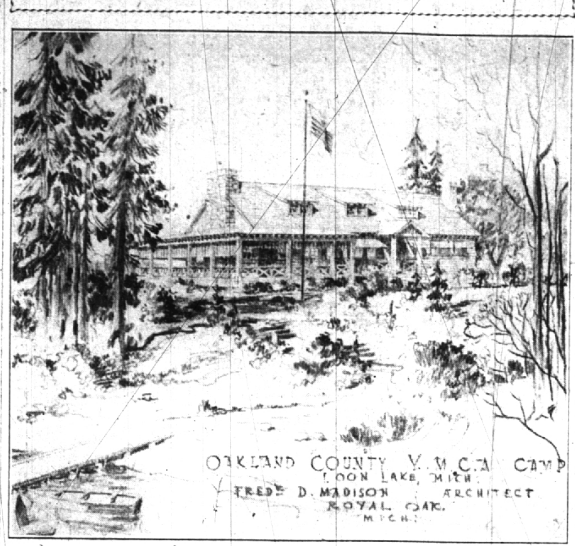
While an estimate for the damage suffered early Sunday in the electrical storm which broke over Birmingham and vicinity, could not be estimated by officials of the Detroit Edison Co., lightning in the northeast section of the village was out of commission for little more than an hour. W. F. Schairer, district foreman for the construction department, announced.

More than 15 calls from residents whose homes were thrown into darkness when lightning struck electric light lines and blew out fuses were reported. Firemen answered two calls, at 1:24 a. m. at Querton road, one half mile west of the Franklin road and another, four minutes later, at Adams road and Knax street. Neither of the fires, caused when lightning struck electric circuits, was serious. Detroit Edison linemen worked during the night repairing the damage and on Monday the service had been completely restored.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Leiland Forman on Querton road was struck by lightning during the storm. The radio was seriously damaged, the telephone and light affected, and electrical wires leading into the house were torn down. It was thought the bolt entered the house on either the radio aerial or the telephone wires.

BREES CONTINUES CARILLON MUSIC

Famous Bellmaster To Be Heard In Recital At Christ Church Tomorrow

Mr. Brees is bellmaster of the Mountain Lake Singing Tower, Fla., and professor of campanology at the Carillon Institute of Music. This is his second series of concerts.

The bells, which make up the largest carillon in America, 62 bells in all, are best heard at a distance of from 500 to 1,000 feet from the tower.
