CONTRACT ON MAINS APPROVED

Parry Plan For 12-Inch Mains From Dixie Well is Granted

A contract between the village and the Birmingham Land Co. for the installation of 12-inch water mains from Dixie well at Eton and Derby avenues, to the village water system, traversing the land company's property, was authorized Monday by the village commission upon the motion of Commissioner Walter C. Connelly.

The resolution was offered after James W. Parry, village manager, reiterated his plea that the agreement be entered into, enumerating the advantages he claimed such an agreement held.

"No matter whether we rate the well at 900 gallons a minute, or 700 or 1,042," he said, "the water main is a necessity we should not delay. The cost to the village is a material saving over any other plan."
