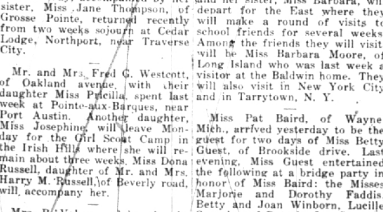
Chicago Couple Off to Circle Globe In Tiny Schooner Bought With Savings

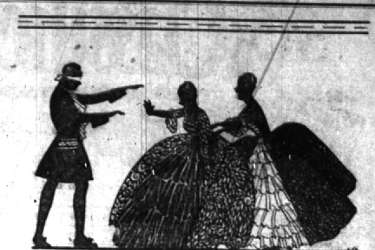

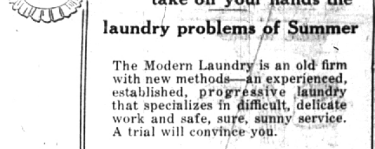
