Quickly Sweetens a Sour Stomach

Science tells us that essential to plant growth are light, food, water, and heat—that all these must be present in sufficient amounts to be of any value to plants. One without the other is of no value. That is, an abundance of water and heat is of no value to plants if there exists a deficiency of plant food.

Lawns turn brown and die during the middle and latter part of summer generally because of a deficiency of plant food.

Water dissolves the plant food in the soil and forms what is known as the soil solution.

A common practice, which is very detrimental to grass, is sprinkling the lawn lightly each day. In doing so the soil is usually saturated only to a depth of a half-inch. This causes the grass roots to come to the surface for moisture, and results in a very shallow root system which will flake out quickly under the rays of mid-summer's sun.

Modern science has made plant feeding a simple matter. You can purchase a complete, scientifically balanced plant food from your dealer in lawn and garden supplies. This can be applied regularly on the surface as you would sow grass seed or be soaked into the soil. Simple directions for applying the plant food are contained in the bag.

Water dissolves the plant food in the soil and forms what is known as the soil solution. This solution, food and water are consumed by plants. Excessive watering will produce an abundant growth as long as the soil's store of plant food lasts; when it is exhausted no amount of water will sustain plant growth.

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MRS. MOORE NOW IS OUT OF DANGER

Rapid Recovery From Accident in Her Home is Expected

Mrs. Herbert E. Moore, of 383 Union avenue, who was severely injured July 23, when she struck her head on the basement floor of her home, that her life was endangered, is in a greatly improved condition and probably out of danger, Dr. George P. Raynale, her attending physician, says.

Mrs. Moore's skull was fractured, and she suffered a hemorrhage at the base of the brain. It was reported Wednesday evening that recovery was doubtful, but an improvement in her condition was noted that night, and the following day, she recovered consciousness.

The accident occurred when Mrs. Moore slipped on the basement steps and struck her head against the basement floor early in the morning. At first she did not believe she had been severely injured, but called Dr. Raynale. Soon after he arrived, she became blind. She lost consciousness on the way to St. Joseph Mercy hospital and did not regain it until Thursday.
