Lansing, July 31.—There is no size limit or creel limit for bullheads taken with hook and line, but there are definite limits for bullheads taken for commercial purposes. Bullheads may not be taken for commercial purposes when they weigh less than eight ounces "in the round."

A recent conviction of a commercial fisherman in Monroe County for possession of undersized bullheads has resulted in many inquiries as to the regulations concerning this species, according to the Law Enforcement Division of the Department of conservation.

Diving into Lake Michigan for a nickel his brother had thrown, George Asher, 16, was drowned.

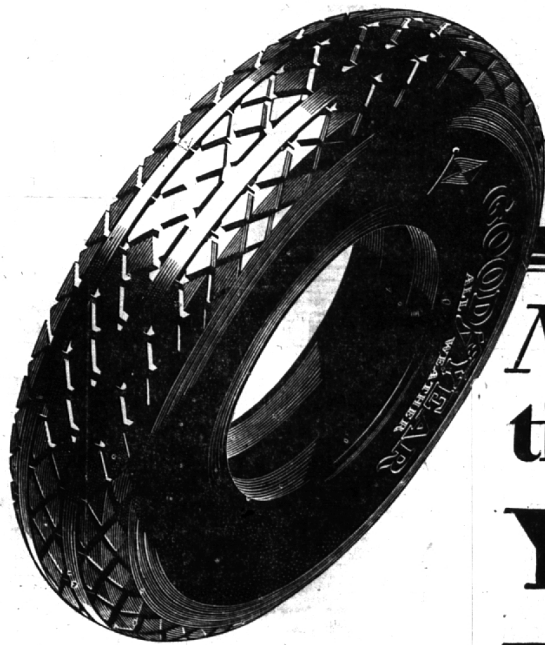
### Newport Visitor
