ever seen honor, or unselfishness, or chivalry, or self-sacrifice, or truth, or love. Yet they are more real and compelling than anything that can be seen.
"Now concerning these unseen realities there are several things which may and should be said. One is that they alone are permanent. Man and his material creations soon return to dust, while the spiritual forces man may set in motion may endure forever.
"Another thing, these unseen realities are not only more permanent but also more powerful. Some critics have remarked that Providence always seems to be on the side of the heaviest battalion, but history gives the lie to that cynicism. Examples of this are: Alexander the Great and Diogenes; Pontius Pilate and Jesus Christ. Things that are seen are no match at all for certain things that are unseen.
"Another thing, these unseen realities are far more important. The things that are seen are temporal, but the things that are not seen are eternal. A man's life does not consist in the abundance of his fine clothes, a beautiful home, plenty of food to eat and in spite of those things commit murder or suicide. Far more important, even to the poor, than food and clothing are faith and hope and love and a new attitude toward life. That is exactly the purpose of the Church. Wherever the Church fulfills its appointed task standards of living are raised through cultivating these important spiritual forces, such as moral responsibility, etc.
"You are to be congratulated upon having arrived, creditably, at this important milestone in your careers. As you enter upon the experiences which shall commence for you in this year's graduation exercises may you always take into account, not only the visible present but also the invisible future. You will discover that the thing of greatest importance to your success is not the visible diploma you are to receive but rather the unseen ideals and motives which have been and shall be built into your lives. At every crossroads you will find the physical and material clamoring for your attention. You will be told that the Golden Rule and the Sermon on the Mount are beautiful theories but that in practice they won't work. Every day of your lives you will be tempted to live according to the rule. Every day for himself and the devil take the hindmost." If you do not realize the value of the compass, the probabilities are that you will yield to that temptation, and it is almost inevitable that someday it will be said of you, "Soul extinct; body well alive." Take the word of a Man who still speaks with authority after 1900 years. "It will profit you nothing to gain the whole world if you lose your own soul."
