

THIRTY ADAMS ATHLETES GET SPORTS HONOR

16 Girls, 14 Boys Rewarded For Physical Education Advances SUP'T VLIET SPEAKS

At the final assembly of the semester in the Adams Junior High School auditorium Friday, 30 students, 16 girls and 14 boys, received athletic awards from Coach Donald Joy and Jeanette Kriekard, girls instructor. Clarence Vliet, superintendent of the Birmingham Public Schools addressed the assemblage of students, particularly the graduating class, upon four means of success through school and life, "Integrity," "Intelligence," "Initiative" and "Industry."

The program opened with selections by the Adams Junior High Girls' Glee Club, following which Coach Joy and Miss Kriekard made the athletic awards. Mr. Smiley gave a short talk on the Model Boat Regatta and Mr. Saboni presented Honor Student Awards. A coronet solo by Bob Saboni presented Mr. Vliet's address and short talks by Walter Jensen, president of the student council, and Fred Schwarze, retiring president, followed. The money was the total profits of the Freshman play, "Rose of the Southland," presented last semester. Closing the ceremonies, Francis M. Cooks, principal of the Adams School, presented diplomas to the graduating class who will enroll in the Baldwin High School next September.

The ninth grade class this semester is the eighth one to be graduated from the Adams Junior High School since its completion three years ago. It is one of the largest classes to enter the Baldwin High School from the Adams.

Reviews Girls' Season Coach Donald Joy made presentation of ten baseball letters and three minor awards to second string men after he briefly reviewed the various sports of the semester. The Adams Junior High nine finished the baseball season with a .600 rating after dropping two of the games played this year. The organization rules that letters be given only to girls who have competed in every sport during both the fall and spring semesters. 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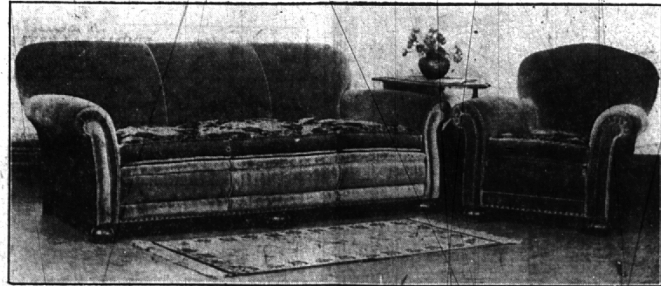
