

# WORLD-WIDE PROGRAM WILL BE BROADCAST

Edison, Marconi, Lord Derby And Others Will Be Heard Over Radio

JUNE 18 IS DATE SET

The most elaborate broadcast ever planned, both from the standpoint of its engineering magnitude and the importance of the persons to be heard, will be attempted June 18 by the National Broadcasting Company.

The broadcast, if successful, will link the World Power Conference in Berlin with the National Electric Light Association Convention in San Francisco, and will present as speakers to both assemblies Thomas Edison from Orange, N. J., Senatore Guglielmo Marconi from London, Owen D. Young from San Francisco, and Lord Derby from Camberley, England. The broadcast was arranged in cooperation with NELA, and will utilize the combined facilities of

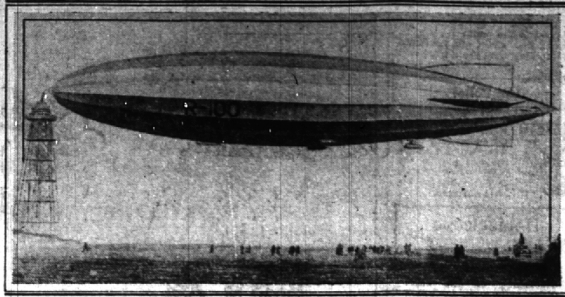
NBC and the short wave facilities of associated stations as well as special facilities of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

The program will begin at 4 o'clock, P. M., Wednesday afternoon, June 18, and will last 45 minutes. Phillips Carlin, NBC announcer, at a microphone in San Francisco, will call the roll of the points of origin of the program, which, in addition to the Pacific Coast city, Berlin, London, and the Edison laboratories in Orange, responses from all points called are expected.

Matthew Sloan, president of the New York Edison Company, will make the opening address from San Francisco. Then the program will be switched to Berlin, where Dr. Carl Koestgen, German engineer and industrial leader, will speak. From Berlin the program will shift to Camberley, England, where Lord Derby, British industrial leader, will speak. Then the program will be shifted back to Berlin for an address by Dr. Oscar von Miller, president of the World Power Conference. Senatore Marconi, the father of radio, will be the next speaker and his remarks will be picked up from London.

From London the program will shift back to San Francisco, where Owen D. Young, chairman of the board of the General Electric Company, will speak. The next point of origin will be the

## Largest Airship Ready for Maiden Flight



An event which the world has been anxiously awaiting is scheduled to take place this summer when the new British dirigible, R-100, shown above, the biggest airship in the world, makes its maiden flight from Cardington, England, to Montreal, Canada, and return. Built to carry 100 passengers in regular trans-Atlantic service, the R-100 is capable of a speed of 80 miles an hour when fully loaded. It is slightly shorter but bigger in girth than the Graf Zeppelin.

Edison laboratories, where the inventor himself will address the world.

The program will be terminated in San Francisco. Five short wave transmitters will send the program to all parts of the world, and the combined coast-to-coast networks of NBC will be utilized.

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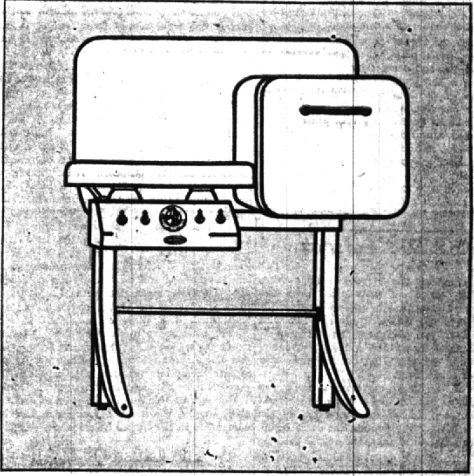
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
