

TWO MEN DIE IN COLLISION

Auto Crashes Head-on Into Truck; Police Were in Pursuit

Two men were killed and their sedan completely wrecked when early Saturday, driving north on the south bound traffic lane in Bloomfield Hills, they struck a five-ton truck and trailer a half mile north of Bloomfield Hills, while being pursued by police officers.

The dead:

ORION D. PANNELL, 34 year old, 9401 Manor boulevard, Detroit, owner of the car, and WILLARD L. PEMBLETON, 28 year old, 7017 Freda avenue, Dearborn. Pembleton is the father of two children.

Pannell was killed instantly and Pembleton died a few minutes after being admitted to St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, Pontiac. Both received fractured skulls and were badly crushed.

The accident occurred at 4:05 a. m. Patrolmen Isma Banks and L. A. Martin were seated in a police car in front of the Bloomfield Hills police station when the light car, traveling at a high rate of speed, passed them, headed north on the wrong side of the road. The officers gave chase, and topping the hill at the entrance to the town of Hendrie estate north of the village, found the wreckage of the smaller car strewn around the truck and trailer.

Peter Heather, 8747 Dillinet street, driver of the truck, started at the prosecutor's office that he was traveling south in the middle of the pavement at the time. He saw the sedan come over the top of the hill, traveling rapidly, and swerved to the right of the road in an attempt to dodge the car. However, the truck was struck with such force as to completely demolish the sedan and badly damage the truck. Neither Heather nor John Stanek, 2708 Livernois street, Detroit, who accompanied him, was hurt.

No inquest will be held, the prosecutor's office announced. Both bodies were brought to Birmingham, where funeral arrangements were completed.

Pembleton's body was shipped to Eden, Ont., where the funeral was held at 2 p. m. Monday afternoon. Services were held for Pannell from the Barrill funeral home in Detroit Tuesday afternoon.

Commissioner Lawrence Hubbert, in commenting upon the possibility of "criss-crossing" taxicabs, expressed himself as unalterably opposed to permitting cabs to operate on the granting of licenses at all. "The only reason they don't stop it (criss-crossing) is in Detroit," he said, "his police could stop it if they wanted to."

"I feel that further competition in this respect, he said, "will ruin the business there now is. It might very possibly result in price-cutting practices and other unpleasant conditions such as happened in Detroit."

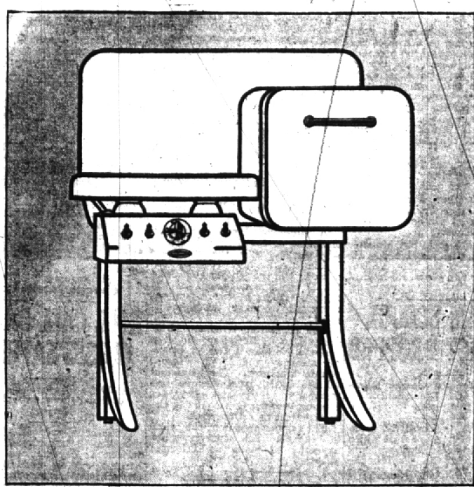
