

### EMPLOYMENT RIGHT CURBED

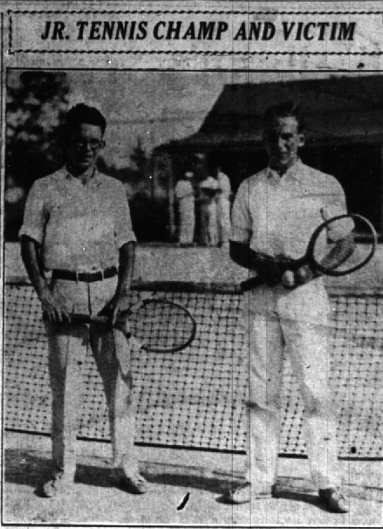
Commission Amends Resolution To Avoid Conflict With Manager

The Village Commission's power to control the employment and discharge of village employes when the village manager neglects or refuses to do so was more strictly regulated to prevent abuses of the power, Monday night, when the commission passed an amendment to the resolution of two weeks ago. The amendment declared that the power should be exercised as seldom as possible so as not to interfere with the efficient control of the village employes by the village manager.

The problem originally arose with the refusal of James W. Parry, village manager, to appoint Philip Schlaack as superintendent of the department of streets and the subsequent demotion of George A. Newman. The request for the appointment of Schlaack was made by the streets committee, composed of Commissioners Maurice Layman and Walter Connelly.

Mr. Parry branded the proposed appointment as "Political" but the commission, indicating it was concerned with the department was imperative, passed a resolution making the appointment mandatory.
