Miss Hildred Johnson, of Adams school, also resigned, and Miss Virginia Hupp of the Hill school, who was married this week will not continue to teach.

Easterday, principal at the Hill School, will take up studies at the University of Michigan. Miss Dorothy Wiles, physical education instructor, will work at the Normal College next fall to obtain her degree.
