BANDSMEN JOIN ADAMS ARCHERS NATIONAL GROUP DEFEAT PONTIAC

Baldwin High School Musicians Enroll To Enter State Contest

Twenty-four Baldwin High School bandmen Tuesday received membership cards in the National High School and Orchestra Association from C. M. Trammis, secretary and treasurer of the organization. Members of the band are joining the association for the purpose of competing in the state band contest next spring. This is the first time any of the bandmen have enrolled in the organization and 16 more have yet to do so before the beginning of the fall semester of school. Several junior members of the band will be lost with the completion of the new Barrum School, but they will return at the end of the fall semester in time for the state contest. Several members of the Adams Junior High Band will also appear next year. Two members of the Baldwin Band have been lost through graduation this year.

Baldwin's band has at present 35 musicians and the band is expected to be considerably larger when it is entered in the contest at Ann Arbor next Spring. It will be the first time that a Baldwin band has ever entered the state band contest.
