## DELAY HEARING ON BIG DRAIN

Oakland-Macomb Project Is Again Deferred To Sept. 9

Discussion of the proposed Oakland-Macomb county \$5,400,000 drain was deferred to Sept. 9 by representatives of the southern county communities before the board of determination, which held its third adjourned hearing last Thursday at the Ferndale city hall.

Ernest L. Hunter, deputy State Commissioner of Agriculture, and a member of the board of determination, had previously told representatives that formation of a metropolitan district under the State Acts of 1929 to cover the drains had been considered. This would eliminate control by the two county drain commissioners, transferring it to a board from each of the communities involved.

The state stream control commission in April turned down a counter proposal for the substitute for the drain, which the representatives filed after being unable to agree on the plan for a joint district.

At the recent Commencement exercises of Olivet College, the President of the Board of Trustees announced an anonymous gift of \$250,000 for a woman's new dormitory which will be erected as soon as the central heating plant has been enlarged to take care of the new building, and plans and specifications have been approved.

It was also announced that a gift of \$250,000 for a scholarship fund had been received from the will of the late William H. Hill of Detroit. These bequests, together with a number of smaller gifts during the past few years, brings the amount to over \$1,100,000.

Another announcement that was received enthusiastically during the Commencement season, was that Joseph Traskowski, the famous captain of the University of Michigan's football team of last year, has accepted the position of assistant coach at Olivet College, and will be the mentor for the football team next fall. Under the leadership of Mr. Traskowski it is expected that Olivet College will win its laurels in the athletic field.

## COUNTY PAVING PROGRESSES

Highway Construction Work Goes On Apace In Fair Weather

With the coming of warmer weather extensive road building is in progress on the state trunk lines in Oakland County, making up the majority of the highway construction work. Telegraph road as far south of Pontiac as Long Lake road is open to traffic and the paving has been completed to a point a half mile below Maple avenue west. This additional pavement, from Maple to Long Lake roads, is expected to be open to traffic in the near future. At the finish of the construction work last fall approximately seven and one-half miles of the road was still unpaved.
