**County Officials Hear N. Y. Man Tell Advantages Of Early Plan**

**EXPLAINS SIMILARITY**

That Oakland County, because of its similarity to Westchester County, N. Y., has exceptional opportunities for developing a modern system of parks and parkways and should do so now while there is opportunity for development was presented yesterday afternoon by Jay Downer, Westchester County Park Commission member, at a meeting of the Bloomfield Hills Country Club.

The meeting was attended by members of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, the county board of trustees, county road commission and representatives of Wayne, Genesee and Macomb counties.

In pointing out the advantages of a system of parks and parkways to provide for the metropolitan population of Detroit, Mr. Downer illustrated the advantage that a program originating with an approved plan of Westchester County now has reached a development with property valued at \$1,700,000, covering 500 acres of parkways, golf courses, swimming pools, and other amusement centers.

Col. Sydney D. Waldron, before introducing Mr. Downer, stated that the topography in Westchester County was very similar to Westchester County and was better suited for development of parkways than of the highway traffic system in more level districts.
