COUNTY APPROVES DRAIN PROJECT

Survey of Birmingham Gardens District Ordered After Hearing

Relief from flooded basements and insufficient drainage conditions is virtually assured residents of the district on Rockingham, Dorchester, and Yorkshire roads east, and of the district on Holland, Webster, and Cole streets east by the order for completion of a drain to serve that district. It is announced today.

A hearing of the county drain commission approved and ordered a survey of the district on Monday. This survey will study the physical conditions and estimate the cost of the drain. This report will be forwarded to the board of determination, and subject to its approval the drain will be constructed, Arthur W. Spencer, county drain commissioner, says.

Harold H. Corson, village engineer, says that in 1921 excavation was begun for a drain in this district. On the strength of the promise of proper drainage, a large number of residents built houses on the east ends of Yorkshire, Dorchester and Rockingham roads and Holland, Webster, and Cole streets. The drain was never completed, and Mr. Corson says that every heavy rain causes water in basements of these homes. The drain when complete will remove this condition.

The district which will be served principally by the drain is that roughly bounded by East Maple road, Rugby and Eton roads, and the northern limits of the village. A large district east of Eton road also will be served.

The drain will extend from about one-quarter of a mile north of the intersection of Eton and Derby roads to approximately the Coolidge Highway. Mr. Corson says.


