

SCHOOL MUSIC CHANGE ASKED

Thursday Musicals Asks Board To Appoint Supervisor To Control Art

Several revisions relative to the instruction of music in the Birmingham public schools were requested by the Thursday Musicals in a petition presented to the Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening at the Baldwin High School.

In the petition the club suggested that the position of supervisor of music be created in the local school system and that more time be allowed for musical instruction, especially in the first four grades where the instruction covers only 45 minutes a week.

The petition further asked that more emphasis be placed on group training, giving the opportunity for musical appreciation to the normal majority rather than the talented few.

Mr. Clarence Vliet, superintendent of Birmingham Public Schools, in an interview with Mrs. Osborne, who represented the Musicals, granted tentative approval to the first two requests.
