Frequent shallow cultivation should be given garden crops. By keeping the surface of the soil stirred a dust mulch is formed, which prevents the loss of moisture through the pores of the soil and keeps down the weeds.
The soil should be cultivated as soon as it is dry enough after a rain to break the crust and prevent caking. Sandy soils may be cultivated when quite wet, but clay soils should not be stirred when sticky. Too much emphasis cannot be placed on the matter of thorough cultivation. In cultivating the garden, small tooth cultivators should be used to prevent crusting or furrowing. Handwork is necessary to keep the soil stirred between the plants and keep

WAGE CAMPAIGN ON WEED CONTROL

M. S. C. Sponsors Train Touring Counties For Aid Of Farmers

A weed-control train will tour fourteen central Michigan counties, including Oakland, under the sponsorship of the New York Central railroad and Michigan State College beginning July 14.

Farmers will be asked to bring weeds to specialists on the train for identification. Last year 600 weeds were identified and 121 species found in this manner. This is part of the second annual campaign to reduce the estimated annual toll of \$25,000,000 of weeds to farm crops in the state.

Counties through which the train will pass are Ingham, Shiawassee, Saginaw, Bay, Tuscola, Sanilac, Oakland, Lapeer, Washtenaw, Jackson, Eaton, Barry, and Kent.

DELPHINIUMS NEED WELL-DRAINED SOIL
Delphiniums thrive best on a well-drained, partially clay soil. The beds should be prepared as well in advance of planting as possible, mixing rotted cow manure with the soil to a depth of about two feet. This should be thoroughly worked over to produce the best soil texture. After planting, the beds should not be allowed to become dry and hard, although if watered too frequently there is danger of encouraging the disease known as black spot.
