

SCOUT TROOP TO FETE CRULL

Retiring Scoutmaster Will Be Honor Guest At Dinner On Tuesday

Boy Scouts of Troop 7 and their parents will honor their retiring Scoutmaster, Howard D. Crull, at a dinner at the Birmingham Community House Tuesday at 6:40 p. m.

Mr. Crull is resigning the post of Scoutmaster of Troop 7, which he has held for nearly six years, to become commissioner of the Bir-

mingham District. His new duties as principal of the Barrum Grade and Junior High School will also take him away from the Scouts in his troop, he announces. His successors as assistant Scoutmaster and Scoutmaster have not been selected.

A committee of the patrol leaders of the troop has planned a program and a suitable menu for the occasion. Howard Senteney, Senior Patrol Leader of the troop, will be toastmaster. Mr. James J. Martindale will speak for the parents, and Stoddard White, patrol leader of the Pine Tree patrol, will speak for the Scouts. Invitations have been sent to the families of all the troop's members and to all old members for a troop reunion. The dinner is open to any Scout in B-3 and his family. All Scouts will be in full dress uniform for the occasion.

Again Candidate For Prosecutor

Mr. Smith, who lives in Pontiac, announces his candidacy for the Republican ticket for Oakland County Prosecutor at the September primary election. It will be his second effort to win that office, his first being two years ago when he was defeated by Norman C. Orr, defeated him.

He is a member of South Lyon Lodge No. 319 F. and A. M., Pontiac Lodge No. 810, B. P. O. Elks, Pontiac Lodge No. 19 Knights of Pythias, of which lodge he is a Past Commander, and the Cook Nelson Post of American Legion. He was the first President of the Pontiac Junior Chamber of Commerce and is a Past President of the Michigan State Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Smith is married and the father of one child. Mr. and Mrs. Smith are members of All Saints Episcopal Church, of Pontiac.

REPORT SHOWS DISEASE DECLINE

Number Of Contagious Cases Drops, Health Department Reveals

Contagious disease continues to decrease in the village with the advance of warm weather, the May health report of Dr. A. W. Newell, village health officer, reveals. During the month 56 cases of contagious disease were reported, a decline from 72 for April and 144 for March. Hemolytic streptococcus cases numbering 18 were noted for May, with slight increase to one in May, and pneumonia from three in April to none last month. Whooping cough was reduced from 23 in March and 12 in April to four in May. Other contagious diseases reported were 11 cases of measles and four of chicken pox.

Mrs. Olga Benning, public health nurse, made 181 home visits to aid in the control of communicable diseases, took 31 throat cultures, and visited 19 babies of less than a year old. She referred 66 persons to a physician and 14 to clinics or hospitals. The Sanitary Department issued 123 permits and 34 water samples, which were examined in the laboratory. Other laborers totaled 290, including 137 throat cultures. Fifteen restaurant workers were referred to the department of health, and 14 permits were issued.

D. 1936 and due hearing given to all objections to the suggestions and objections to the proposed improvement, therefore:

Be it further resolved that Special Assessment District No. 209 is hereby established to consist of all abutting lots and parcels of land except lots facing Chestnut Avenue, upon which is believed and spread according to benefits, the sum of \$2,182.77 of the cost of the project, according to an estimate heretofore prepared by the Village Manager and now on file with the Village Clerk and

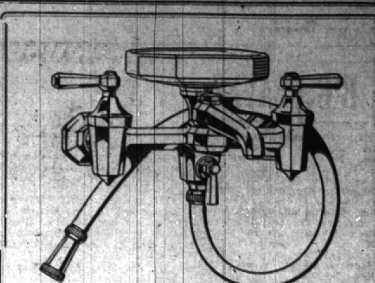

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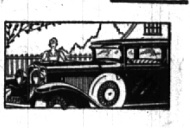
Birmingham Boys Star At College
