Chicagoan Scores First 'Hole-in-One'

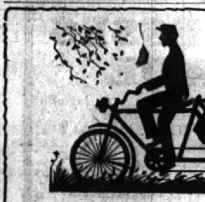

BUILDING DROP IS RECORDED

Construction Permits Issued During May Show Decline, Egbert Reports

Building activities in Birmingham which rose to remarkable heights during April when permits for buildings valued at \$237,375 were issued, fell during the month of May to \$109,140, according to the report of Donald C. Egbert, building inspector.

Permits during May totaled 15 residences, garages and miscellaneous structures. Six permits for single residences valued at \$94,500; a double residence valued at \$9,800 and eight other permits were issued. Permits for alterations to buildings costing \$3,700 were included in this list.

Comparative statistics in Mr. Egbert's report show that in April of 1929 permits for new buildings and alterations estimated at \$158,873 were issued, while in May of 1929, the total for the same work was \$121,700, or similarly, a normal decline in building activities in May. Building in the village from Jan. 1 to May 31, inclusive, during 1930 totaled \$576,640, as compared with \$597,448 in 1929. Birmingham eighth in value of permits issued in April, 1930, for the State of Michigan.

Detroit, \$4,556,439; Dearborn, \$872,665; Flint, \$477,485; Lansing, \$445,712; Grand Rapids, \$328,470; Bay City, \$373,273; Battle Creek, \$287,355; Birmingham, \$237,375; Kalamazoo, \$183,939; Jackson, \$179,359.

Violet Announces Swimming May Be Enjoyed At School This Summer

Four Seek Post

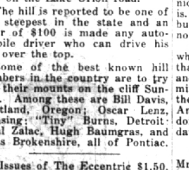

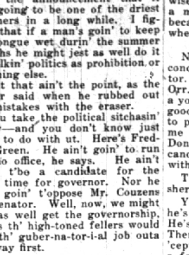

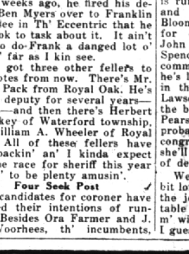
