He pointed out the utter uselessness of war in modern and civilized times and portrayed the increased horrors in the wars of the future. William Dean and Morris Winborn, were also credited for the fine presentation of their orations. William's subject was the "Communist Movement and Morris," the "Abolition of Future Wars."

The decisions were given by a faculty committee of judges including Melvin C. Hart, principal, Miss Beulah Packard, Mrs. Arts Horwath and H. Earle Corvont.

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
