Pink And White For Easter Bride

It looks as though we were to

see more pink and white Easter weddings this year than for several seasons. White is in the height of fashion, and so is pink. Patou's new pink, rose organdie, which is a tint becoming to most complexions, has popularized pink as the new color. Fashion chooses to exploit each season invariably does ingratiate itself in the color vogue everywhere. Naturally the bride will wear white. There have been attempts in the past few seasons to introduce pale pastels for brides, but generally speaking, it is difficult to swerve the bride from the tradition white unless she chances to be a widow.

Lace is very much in the limelight of fashion just now, so the bride may indulge in lace to the nth degree, although, again generally speaking, no bridal frock is ever quite complete without it. The bridal frock shown in the sketch is of alençon lace and white satin. The fitted bodice is entirely of the lace, and affects a high line at the throat and long sleeves. The skirt is of soft white satin with marked fullness at the back, ending in a long train. Over this is draped a long bridal veil of tulle falling from a lace cap. The feet are clothed in white satin pumps which may have a bit of lace incorporated at the throat. The bridesmaid's frock is of white organdie with its crisp fullness expressed in a jaunty peplum in dounce, the fullness repeated in another deep flounce at the hemline. The bodice is embroidered in cross-stitch in shades of rose. With this is worn a picture hat of pink and white, and either pink or white kid slippers. A white pump is usually chosen, as it will prove more serviceable afterward with many costumes. Pink roses, or the little pink and white old-fashioned nosegay may be carried.

The pinkest note is struck by the matron of honor. As she follows the bride, separating her from the bridesmaid, this pinkest note is exactly where it belongs. Her frock may be a little more sophisticated. The one shown in the sketch is of Patou's new pink, tulle and one-fourth teaspoon cin-

the fabric, chiffon; the bodice criss-crosses in the back, and there are long cape panels suggesting short sleeves. The skirt has a tiered treatment, which gives it an animation equal to that of the bridesmaid. The flowers at the back of the waistline make an effective break in the long lines. With this is worn a picture hat of white horsehair trimmed with rose-ribbon in a deeper tone than the dress. The slippers may be of moire, crepe or satin, dyed to match the gown. Pink or white and pink flowers are carried.

Today's menu was planned for children as well as adults. The little children, however, should not have pie for luncheon, but a simple dessert made especially for them.

Today's Recipes
Blueberry Pie Filling—Drain the juice from one can of blueberries, and into it slice one-half apple. Let cook until tender and put through sieve. Add to the berries. To one cup of sugar add three tablespoons flour, pinch of the sketch is of Patou's new pink, tulle and one-fourth teaspoon cin-

namon. Add this to the berry mixture and mix thoroughly. Dots of butter may be added. Bake this as a two-crust pie.

German Sour Gravy—Into the fat left after frying the bacon and liver, put four tablespoons flour. Let cook until real brown, stirring constantly. Add one cup water, and cook until thick. Put into this one-quarter bay leaf and four peppercorns. Let cook for a few minutes. Add one-fourth cup vinegar, pepper and salt to taste. Strain before serving. This gravy can be made from bacon drippings and is very good to serve with leftover meat.

Apple Sauce—Pare and quarter six apples. Make sirup of one cup sugar and two cups water. Put slice of lemon into sirup and cook for two minutes. Remove and add quartered apples. Cook until tender when pierced with fork. Chill well before serving.


Suggestions
Shredded Cabbage Salad—Select a firm head of cabbage. Shave off enough to make two cups. Crisp in cold water, then drain and dry between clean towels. Add one tablespoon chopped green pepper, one tablespoon chopped pimientos, one grated onion if desired, and the outside stalks of celery diced very fine. To one-third cup mayonnaise add one tablespoon lemon juice, one-half teaspoon salt, one tablespoon catsup, one-fourth teaspoon prepared mustard, one teaspoon onion juice (scrape a sharp knife across a cut onion to get the juice). This makes a delicious dressing for any meat or vegetable salad.
