When "Joe" Was Clerk

"Coming to Pontiac on legal business has kept all the residents of Oakland County in touch with the people here. Joseph Stockwell when a young man was clerk in his lifelong pleasant manner, he would sell us women a spool of thread or a yard of calico for piece work. But we had a grievance when he took to wife one of our girls and went to Pontiac to make his permanent home. For a number of years he was one of our best Probate Judges, of which we have had many fine men.

"I see that Homer Colvin is on the program committee. He was one of our legal advisers. His sisters, Emma Colvin Heath of Pomona, California and Ellen Colvin Carpenter were among our teachers as was also Lucy Buttrick Geris and Frank Conley Daniels.

"The County Fair held at Pontiac was always a great event. The State Fair was also held there twice. The fair grounds were on West Huron near the place the City Hospital now stands. The women of Pontiac gave meals at the fairs and worked hard in various ways in order to raise money to build a city hospital. At that time the nearest hospital was at Flint, Mich. After a sufficient amount of money had been raised the ladies turned the hospital over to the city management.

"In 1899 the Detroit United railway built their lines out into the country many miles. Our division went through on Main Street of Clawson to Flint, turning on to the Rochester Road at Stiles Corners, one mile north of Troy Corners. It brought up land values beyond all we had ever dreamed of. Then along came Henry with his "struggle buggy" and a well paid job for everybody. This raised land values of our beautiful Oakland County lakes and hills, valleys, creeks, and rivers so none could afford to raise crops. The wary sons of Israel had bought most of our bright in the most productive and beautiful county in the United States, and in one of the best states of the union. The slogan of the Florida Tourist Club was: Michigan, Michigan Lakes galore! Salt and Copper Iron ore Coal and oil Fruits to can No other state... Lake Michigan

**Climate For Everyone**

"There is also climate to suit everyone and it is often changed on short notice.

"In the good old days there were many families, east of us, of Scotch Irish parentage. They had brought with them from Emerald Isle and the land of the Kilbies and bagpipes, the faith of their fathers. They were church going, sabbath keeping citizens which was another reason why Troy Township has never been a breeder of criminals. They thoroughly believed in Saint Paul's admonition, "To watch, and fight, and pray," and especially to fight along about presidential election time. The terms "Copperhead" and "carpetbagger" were used by people who at other times were good friends and neighbors. I have first hand knowledge of the weeks of the campaign when James G. Blaine was running against Grover Cleveland. A very large Republican Pole was raised on the corner of John Lawson's home. Speakers came from all over Oakland County. Joseph Smith, supervisor of Troy Township for 18 years, who introduced the speakers said, "The Democrats are trying to ruin this country." I smiled, knowing there would be a counter attack. Early the next morning John went but to view his beloved Blaine Banner. Just across the street, on our place, stood the trimmest, straightest hickory pole with a life size picture of Grover Cleveland floating out saucily toward his home. After he had recovered he called his women folks, who were strong Democrats, being daughters of Jonathan Chase, our Democratic Representative some years before. There was hand clapping and laughing of the heartiest kind. Crows drove through Clawson all the next day trying to figure out how that mushroom pole sprang up in one night.

"In conclusion I wish to read you this little tribute sent me by a friend in California, the only living one who attended our wedding 64 years ago. Since it applies to many old people like myself they may appreciate it as I do.

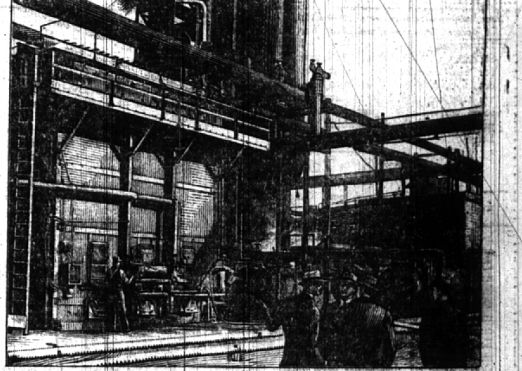

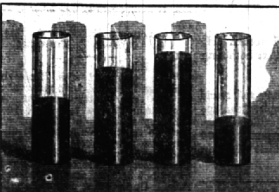

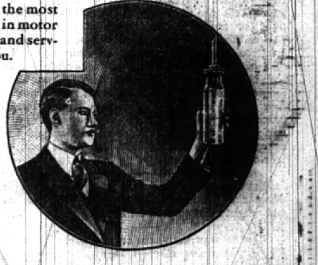
