\$20,000 Real Estate Transaction Reported By Local Firm

Sale of a 60-foot lot at the northwest corner of Maple avenue and Worth street for Horace E. Shaw to the D. M. Newbro Corp. of Detroit was announced today by the real estate firm of Colgrove, Buck and Tilton. The financial consideration for the transaction is understood to be \$20,000.
