

EXCHANGITES FIRST TO DINE IN NEW HOUSE

Mrs. Charles J. Shain Welcomes Village Lunch-club

PRATT IS SPEAKER

Birmingham Exchanges were accorded the honor Tuesday noon of being the first local luncheon club to be welcomed at the new Community House, where they will probably meet in the future. Mrs. Charles J. Shain, president of the Community House administrative board, officially welcomed the club at its first meeting there. "We are happy to greet you men in this new Community House, your own Community House," she said. "It belongs to the whole people," stated Mrs. Shain in a brief talk. "May I take this opportunity, too, to say that we, on the board, realize that some criticism has been made of the methods used in building this house; these methods, however, were adopted only upon the advice of 16 substantial men of Birmingham, who were motivated by the desire to save five or ten thousand dollars in the construction work. We feel sure that the public appreciates our efforts to conserve their funds."

Walter M. Pratt, of Southfield avenue, Exchangeite, spoke briefly on several club subjects, including the plans for the creation of a "Dirty Dozen" committee, "to be comprised of clowns, jesters, and interlopers."

Charles A. Bingham, chairman of the club's committee which staged the recent small stamp memorial service in honor of Harry Brooks, reported on the fine publicity which the affair gave Birmingham, as well as its value to aviation in general. He read several letters of congratulation from National Exchange club leaders, also one from William Stout, of the Stout Airline, who knew Harry personally. Mr. Stout suggested that Birmingham could better honor its aviation-hero by building an airport, and asked that he be allowed to be the first to land upon it.

C. M. T. C. OPENS VILLAGE QUOTA

Basic Course At Camp Custer Lasts From July 18 To Aug. 16

Birmingham youths who would enjoy a month's vacation at the Citizen's Military Training Camp at Camp Custer from July 18 to Aug. 16, may make application through L. A. Martin, 108 East Brown street, committeeman of C. M. T. C. affairs for this district.

The quota for this district is 60 boys and the only qualifications is that each boy be between the ages of 17 to 24, must have average intelligence, ability to read and write English. Previous military training is not necessary.

"The basic course which will be given at Camp Custer this summer," Mr. Martin says, "provides preliminary physical, mental and moral training, including bodily development, athletics, drill, rifle, marksmanship, first aid, sanitation, personal hygiene, courtesy, discipline and studies in citizenship. Boys who attend these courses for four years in succession receive, upon examination, a commission in the Reserve Officers.

VILLAGE STILL PLANTING TREES

Municipal planting of trees for beautifying the village probably will be continued this year despite the evident lack of public interest in financing the project. On Monday, James W. Parry, Village Manager, told the commission that he had received complaints from purchasers of the trees who complained reported most of them trees had died.

"The mortality rate of these trees is more than 50 per cent while, ordinarily the mortality rate of such trees is only about 15 per cent," Mr. Parry explained. "Of course all the trees that died after planting were replaced in the future the trees will be sold on a cash basis."
