INDIFFERENCE HURTS SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Parents And Students Guilty Of That Attitude, Mr. Hart Says

OPPOSED TO NOTES

In reference to the attendance conditions in Baldwin High School, Melvin C. Hart, principal, states in a recent report that the attitude taken in many cases by the students and parents with regard to absence from school is more or less indifferent. Some parents take exception to the requirement that they present written excuses for their children's absences but would take unfair advantages, he said.

According to the rules of the attendance department absences excuses come under three divisions. They are, excused, no-reduction and unexcused. To obtain a white slip which merits an excused absence the students must present a note stating that either sickness, a death, or equivalent reason prevented his attendance and instructors should recognize these conditions, allowing the student the opportunity to make up the work, within a certain period, which he missed. In legitimate cases such as athletic trips

which do not justify work making up the lost time, is presented otherwise known as a no-reduction slip. The blue slip which is issued in all cases when the absence is not necessary.

The general system of slips is based on the individual honesty of either student or parent and Mr. Hart further says, "I can see no reason why students should be made in these reports if our whole school plan in a general way is to be maintained. It breaks down there is little else to depend upon."

Waterman, head of the Junior High department of Baldwin High School, who has been an instructor in the school for many years, states that the attendance is rated according to grades. The fact that the seventh grade has the lowest average percentage of attendance per year and the lowest aggregate attendance, almost invariably holds true in every school.
