ADRIAN BEATS BALDWIN, 38-19

Local Cage Team Falls In Final Contest; St. Mary's Next On Schedule.

IN TOURNEY TOMORROW

The Baldwin High School cage quintet closed its original schedule of 16 games Friday, falling to the Adrian High School five, 38-19, on the Maroons' court. A certainty of one and a possibility of two games yet to be played remain on the Baldwin's post-season card. Tomorrow night the Englewood journey to Pontiac to clash with the St. Mary's Academy from Orchard Lake in the first game of the "Six" tourney. The game promises to be a tough one for the Maroons because St. Mary's, although registered as a class B school, its student body lists many class A players.

Using a baffling passing combination that sprouted early in the first quarter, the visitors rimmed seven of the 10 shots and four free shots while Birmingham scored three out of five tosses at the hoop and four gift shots, making the count 18-10 when the whistle ended the half. A fast closing home-team defense almost demolished an Adrian dribbling attack that marked the opening of the game. Toward the last of the initial canto, the visiting squad's overhauled attack team swung into action. The Adrian team slowly crept into a 19 point lead.

Baldwin's own attack failed and their shots at the basket were usually batted down or their passes intercepted. Schwartz, playing his best game of the season, bagged seven of the losers' points, as well as missing up points, as well as missing up points, as well as missing up points.

Adrian scored three field baskets and three foul shots to end their scoring. A shot by Wormer went through the rim after he had tossed it backwards and it rolled around the basket before it dropped through. Dailey scored shortly after he went into the game and Gottrell ended the contest with Adrian's last shot.

The Birmingham second team lost a fast preliminary game to the East Detroit second string men, 28-21. Brown was high scorer of the tilt with 14 points for the Baldwinites.
