LITERARY CLUB HOLDS LAST MEET

George Smith, director of the Michigan branch of the League of Nations Society, spoke to the members Tuesday in the Baldwin Public Library on "The Operation of Our Factories Abroad."

The idea that many of our factories abroad grew up as a result of the War was refuted by Mr. Smith, who explained that a large percentage of them were established before the War and were a natural outgrowth of this country's expanding wealth. Patent laws and high tariff rates were responsible for many of the factories established in Europe, he said.

Statistics were quoted to show that the industrial turnover in foreign countries now amounts to \$22,000,000,000, while the turnover in intangible things amounts to between 12 and 14 billion dollars, advancing annually at the rate of \$2,000,000,000.

A number of European industries are also located in America, Mr. Smith said, also the ratio is not equal. Turnover of foreign industries in America approximates \$4,000,000,000, about 60 per cent of which comes from the rayon industry. Foreign capital is also invested in molasses, steel, and phonographs in this country, according to the speaker.

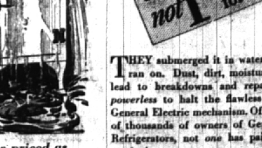
