SCHOOL WORK EXHIBIT VOTED BEST SUCCESS

Annual Display Of Students Art At Baldwin Attracts Over 2,000

CLASSES ARE PRAISED

More than 2,000 persons attended the annual Baldwin High School exhibit held Friday night in the high school, according to the mechanical count recorded by the Maroon and White, the official publication of the school. The exhibit was considered one of the most successful ever given, both from the standpoint of displays and attendance.

The exhibits in each department including class rooms, cooking, sewing, art, manual arts, science and the school paper work-rooms were prepared by the students under the direction of the instructors. The sewing department

ment under the direction of Miss Eleanor Miller featured a fashion parade and the domestic art show included homecooking and a home nursing exhibit. The manual arts exhibit was considered exceptionally interesting, demonstrating a college boy's bedroom arranged and furnished, the furniture all constructed by the students. Earl Zeigler exhibited his miniature yacht which he constructed and which rates a speed of seven miles an hour run by electric motor.

Journalism Attracts

This year for the first time the Maroon and White prepared an exhibit showing the work in connection with the departments of the staff including editorial, business, advertising, and mechanical as well as showing by individual cartoons each school activity which the paper supports.

Another of the interesting exhibits was the art department display where the work done in the last year under the direction of Mrs. Helen Kidder was shown. This display included clay modeling, crayon, drawing, pen and ink, water colors, stage designing, toy making and various other forms of art studied in the classes. The science department under Miss Heister Bradley and W. S. Toothaker gave three special acts including experiments with liquid air, dry ice and a farce entitled "Explosion."

Following the departmental display a gymnastic exhibit and band concert was given in the gymnasium. The members of the airplane club demonstrated model airplane flights during this program. The athletic program given by both boys and girls was directed by Miss Helen MacIntyre and Ernest Engle.

Errors Enable Wyandotte To Defeat Baldwin, 5 to 1

WYANDOTTE'S 5-1 victory over the Baldwin High School nine in the downtown community Saturday was the direct result of two errors in the last two innings which enabled the winners to score four runs.

The score, however, does not indicate the closeness of the contest. Baldwin getting five hits and Wyandotte six while both pitchers struck out nine men each in the six and a half innings played.

SAFETY CLUB GIVEN PRAISE

Hill School Patrol Lauded For Its Work By Teachers, Principal

Since its organization two years ago, the Safety Patrol of the Hill School has earned for itself a prominent place in school activities. The club is composed of both boys and girls, and the Safety Patrol, which numbers 10 boys has full charge of policing the school playgrounds. Each member wears a green arm band.
