

## '30 BALDWINIAN ISSUED TODAY TO STUDENTS

High School Year Book Is  
Dedicated To Memory  
Of Harry Bradley

### PROGRESS IS SHOWN

The "Baldwinian" the year book of the Baldwin High School published annually by the Senior classes, was distributed to approx-

imately 500 subscribers today. This annual, 1929-30, edited by Wallace Gail, is dedicated to Melvin C. Hart, principal of the high school, and to the memory of Harry Bradley, an alumnus who died Oct. 5, 1929. The class and staff also express their appreciation to Mrs. Alis Horwath, literary adviser and Miss Helen Taylor, business adviser who assisted in making the book a success.

The theme of the book is based on the building progress of the community with the building progress of the local school system. The scenes used in the annual are pen and ink drawings made by students in the art classes under Mrs. Helen Kitter.

Each section is introduced by one of these sketches according to the following plan: administration and faculty by the municipal building; classes, by an interior view of the public library; Junior High school, by the new Barnum Junior High school activities, by the community house; athletics, a sketch of Pierce field; feature section, by the Village Players; and the advertisers, by the Wakefield building. Charcoal sketches of the Baptist Church, the Hanna building under construction, St. Stephen Park, and a corner view of the high school also have places in the book.
