

HUDSON AGAIN ENTERS RACE

Congressman Announces Candidacy For Re-nomination in Primaries

Congressman Grant M. Hudson of East Lansing and Lansing, has announced himself as a candidate for re-nomination in the September Primaries looking towards reelection in November. He is completing his fourth term as Representative of the Sixth District, one of the largest and most important districts from an industrial and

financial standpoint in the entire Congressional list.

The first four years of his service in Congress found him a member of the Civil Service Committee, Insular Affairs Committee and the Indian Affairs Committee, as well as a member of the Committee on Accounts.

As a member of the Insular Affairs Committee he was very active in the affairs of the Philippines, and as Chairman of a sub-committee drafted the legislation which gave citizenship to the inhabitants of the Virgin Islands.

During the last four years he has served as a member of the major Committee on Rivers and Harbors.

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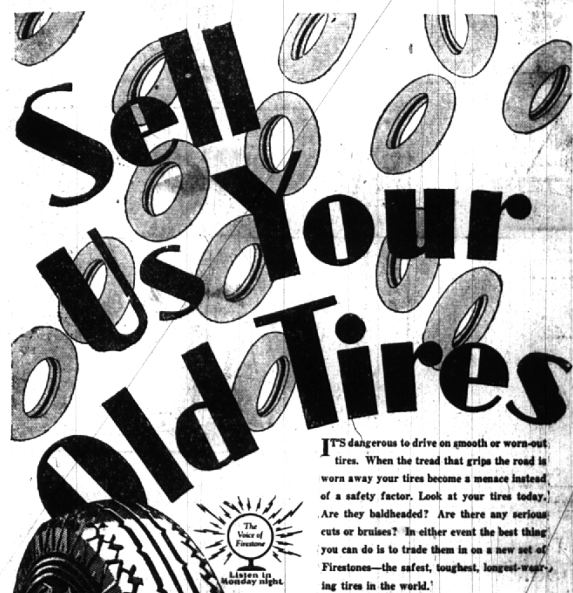
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
