California Cocktail—Dice two

APPLE CUSTARD (for One-Crust Pie)

Line a deep pan with the pie crust. Pare and grate four medium apples; sweeten them. One heaping tablespoon cornstarch, two eggs well beaten, a little nutmeg, one tablespoon melted butter. Mix well; add one cup milk; if too thick add more milk. Pour in the prepared crust, then sprinkle thickly with ground nuts (English walnuts preferred) and bake until crust is done.

large juicy apples and mix with the dried portion of the oranges. Add three tablespoons of sugar and chill on ice. Serve in low sherbets surrounded with cracked ice.

Breaded Bacon.—Dry strips of bacon into beaten eggs, roll in cracker crumbs and season. Fry slowly to a crisp golden brown. One egg will dip about four strips.

Brown Puff.—One cup brown sugar, one-fourth cup butter, two eggs (without whites), one-half cup milk, one cup flour, one and one-half teaspoon baking powder, one-half teaspoon cinnamon, one fourth teaspoon cloves (ground). Bake in a hot oven. Beat egg whites with one-half cup of brown sugar and put on top of the cake to brown in the oven as the meringue.

Party Dessert
A party dessert of this nature is easily arranged. Scoop vanilla ice cream with a round or pointed ice cream scoop and arrange in a ring on a large plate. Fill the center of the circle with canned peaches, pouring over them a raspberry sauce.

THE Parisian insistence on the "dressmaker" touch in all new styles gives all the breaks to the woman who can sew.

There is no reason why she cannot dress handsomely this season. It is all in knowing combination of colors, union of fabrics, lines of her own figure and the type that she personifies.

For it is a year when one may wear just about what she pleases, so long as she knows the "has a waistline that lingerie touches flatter her, that skirts are prettier when the lower edges flare and that blouses are smartest when they tuck in and when they have short sleeves.

More, the woman who can sew still discover this is a magnificent opportunity to use up a fine bit of this or that. Lace that she has had on hand, a lovely collar, a yard and a half or so of hand-drawn fabric that she brought back from Arabia, a half dozen exquisite jeweled buttons that her mother once had—all of these can form the nucleus of lovely costumes.

There are various ways of tying a costume all up together into a beautiful whole. For instance, there is a little suit with pleated taffeta jacket in navy blue with gold, red and green lines, has a navy blue taffeta skirt, with its hem stitched in the colors of the jacket's plaid. There is a scarf of the skirt's plain blue and the little belt is made of the wool of the coat. There is a little light blue tuck-in blouse, and a scarf of the blouse's blue line.

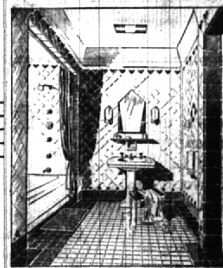
TWO ways of making chic into one's wardrobe are shown here. First, there is a Louise-boulanger sports ensemble in a combination of blues. The jacket is a fine semi-sheer crepe, made belted and stitched and lined with soft silk crepe in a novelty plaid effect.

The stripes are wider and the blue deeper in color near the hem, which is the same navy as the jacket. The lapels of the jacket are lined with the material and the little belt is made of the wool of the coat. There is a little light blue tuck-in blouse, and a scarf of the blouse's blue line.



Suitable for the golf links or for a morning's shopping in town is the sports ensemble at the left. The jacket is lined with the same material as the skirt. The afternoon ensemble, right, is of black wool crepe, made with a fitted yoke to which pleats are attached.

In an A-line knot under the chin it is a lovely outfit, feminine, flattering and of charming color. The second suit shows the efficacy of a little imagination in the way of hand-stitching. It is a Holyday suit of black wool crepe made with a very deep fitted yoke to which pleats are attached all around to make a full skirt. The jacket is superbly and has a white fur collar. The distinguished thing about this suit is its diagonal white stitching which decorates the deep skirt yoke and the entire front and sleeves of the coat. It is original and effective. It can be copied very easily or the idea adapted to suit one's needs. To touch off the elegance of this suit, there is a delicate little hand-made white georgette blouse, with diagonal creasing running the opposite direction from the white stitching on the skirt. A narrow white belt tops the skirt, for an added touch.
