

### NOT A RADIO SET? QUERY EXPLAINED

Gov. Seeks Census Of Receiving Sets To Help Serve "Listeners"

The question "Have you a radio?" was included among the questions asked in the 1930 census primarily for the purpose of aiding the Government in its important task of administering the radio problems of the nation, Secretary Robert P. La Follette of the department of Commerce, has declared.

The question has absolutely no connection with possible taxation of any other associated idea, the secretary states. Government officials believe that accurate information as to the number of receiving sets and their location will be of assistance in promoting satisfactory radio reception throughout the country, and it is for this reason and this reason alone that the question was included, Secretary La Follette has pointed out.

In discussing the value of the survey to the Federal Radio Commission, Maj. Gen. Charles McK. Altam, chairman of the Commission, declared that the data which will be procured as a result of the radio question will be

### MUCH OF VILLAGE WELFARE WORK CENTERS AROUND THRIFT SHOP

For fear that Birmingham people, engrossed in the splendid social facilities of the Community House, may forget its humanitarian aspects, Mrs. Grace Trumbull has agreed to tell of the work of the employment and thrift shops, of which she is in charge.

An average of 20 people patronize the thrift shop, located in the basement of the House, Tuesday and Saturday afternoons, when it is open. Everything from hats
