Mrs. Kane is a graduate of Western State Normal College at Kalamazoo, and has taught for nine years. Her home is in Sparta.

Miss Hildegard Johnson, teacher of the third grade at Pierce school, will leave at the end of the school year to be married. Miss Jeannette Kreicard, physical education instructor at Adams school, will return again next year in the same position.

Two new teachers were hired for next year. Miss Grace Caruthers, of Bancroft, Mich., will be in charge of foods at Barron High School and Barron academy. She received a B. S. degree from the Michigan State College in 1927, and is teaching now at Three Rivers, Mich. Miss Genevieve Craig, of Rogers City, Mich., will be in charge of grade three at Pierce school. She was graduated from Michigan State Normal college at Ypsilanti in 1929, and has had three years teaching experience.

Bloomfield Police Arrest 'Em And Judge Buck Fines 'Em

**FOUR VILLAGE BOYS TO CAMP**

C. M. T. C. Accepts Applications, Others Seek Training, Stanley Reports

Four Birmingham youths have been accepted so far for the Citizens Military Training Camps this summer. Captain Lloyd L. Stanley, district C. M. T. C. officer says. They are Malcolm Rorer, Maywood road; Charles A. Flower, P. F. B. No. 8; Sanford B. Waring, 248 North Bates street; and Harry W. Winborn, 315 Brown street.

Many others have asked for blanks, and otherwise signified their interest of attending the camp. "Never before have more than two from this district attended," Captain Stanley said. "The number shown this year is greater than that has ever been in the past."

The camps are conducted between July 15 and August 16, and registration continues up, until the opening date. Those desiring to attend this summer should get in touch immediately with Captain Stanley. The training boys get in these camps is perhaps the finest a boy can possibly receive, as it includes mental, moral, and physical training," he asserted. "Less than one-third of the day time is actually spent in military work, he explained, most of it being devoted to games and instruction in citizenship. The training courses of these camps have been continuously endorsed by the Western Intercollegiate Conference, and such coaches as Knute Rockne, Fielding H. Yost, Alonzo A. Stagg, George Little, L. W. St. John, George Huff, and others. The camps are open to boys between the ages of 17 and 21 years.

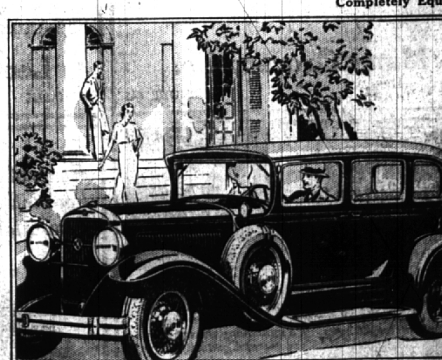
