

Cranbrook Scores Victory; Junior Squad Loses

Surprise Planned By Junior Group

Plans are now completed for the sale of the Baldwin high school Junior Washington Group's "surprise" project, in which will be made available to school students at the annual Turkey Day game to be played with

Royal Oak Thanksgiving Day. According to the group advisers, William Maywood and Miss Freda Huggert, no similar project has ever before been attempted. The group expects successful sales. Members will canvass Baldwin high school as well as the other village schools on the days immediately preceding the Thanksgiving game.

Cranbrook Rallies In Last Quarter To Beat D. U. S.

AFTER a mediocre first half, Cranbrook's varsity came back into the second part of the game last Friday to score three times against Detroit University School and win 19-0. The game, which was the first local private school game to be played at Cranbrook, was well attended by a large crowd of supporters from both teams, as well as a number of other interested spectators who shared in the jubilation or dismay at Cranbrook's victory over her major Detroit rival.

During the first half there was no scoring, and for the most part the two periods both teams played a see-saw game up and down the field. Cranbrook attempted to put over a score early in the contest when they reached the D. U. S. 20 yard line, but some new plays which the Blue and Gray were trying out failed to go smoothly, and D. U. S. intercepted a pass at that point. The visitors hit the line for several gains and finally punted to Cranbrook's 20 yard line, but were unable to carry the ball deep into Blue and Gray territory.

A Costly Fumble. No serious threat at either goal occurred until late in the second quarter when Cranbrook drove into the yard line. Rose had run back a D. U. S. punt 45 yards, and Rauch and Raymond had carried the ball further until it now rested all but on the goal line. At this point, however, Cranbrook fumbled, and the opportunity was lost for at the same moment the half ended.

During the second half with more punch, Cranbrook slowly warmed up to their top form. Rauch and Raymond were busy on the exchange of punts, they carried the ball to the 15 yard line where, however, another fumble lost a second chance to start the scoring. Hereupon the Blue and Gray took hold of things and unleashed a more determined attack. Rauch starred in an advance to the 15 yard line, and the 35 yard line, and Raymond made the first touchdown from the 3 yard line. Lynch kicked the goal.


As has happened more than once before, Cranbrook rallied during the final period. Unusual plays were absent, but straight football, marked again by Rauch's carrying of the ball and one or two short passes, brought the ball to D. U. S. 2-yard line shortly after the beginning of the period. Raymond again scored, and the same performance was repeated shortly before the final whistle. D. U. S. put up a good fight till the end. Donovan being the outstanding one on the visiting team, but they were unable to withstand Cranbrook's steady drives.

Cranbrook's opponent tomorrow will be the Detroit Country Day School, in Detroit. This is the next to last school on the Cranbrook schedule, Baldwin High School being their final opponent of the season.

This afternoon the juniors will meet the Berkeley High School B team in their second meeting of the season at the Cranbrook Stadium at their former game, the teams played a 12-12 tie.

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BALDWIN OUT OF RUN MEET

Harriers Too Young For State Contest, Coach Whitney Announces

Because not enough of the members of the Baldwin High School cross-country team are of required age, the team will not enter in the forthcoming South-eastern Athletic association meet, according to Coach Franklin Whitney.

Actually, therefore, the season ended for the harriers Nov. 1, with the regional meet at Ferndale. At that time, through a misunderstanding as to the meeting-place, only two members of the team, David Burgess and Maurice Gravel, were in the meet. Requirements for the State meet, held last Saturday, are that the school shall have entered a team of at least five men in the regional meet. Consequently the school was eliminated from participation in the State meet. Requirements are that at least four of the regulation team of six shall be 16 years of age or older, and the Baldwin sextet cannot fulfill this requirement, so will not enter the Southeastern meet. Members of the team say that the Southeastern meet, which is open to the thirteen schools of the northern and southern divisions of the League, is the fastest of the season, usually proving a faster meet than even the State contest.

JUNIORS TO HOLD CHEER CONTEST

Barium, Adams and Baldwin Groups To Compete Tomorrow

Plans have been completed for the Birmingham Junior High Schools' cheering contest to be held at Pierce Field tomorrow afternoon at the annual Birmingham-Hazel Park game.

The Junior cheering sections will be seated in the east bleachers which will be divided into three sections to accommodate students from Barium, Adams, and Baldwin junior high schools. Upon the following points will depend the decision of the judges, who will be Clarence Vliet, one school board member, and a Baldwin high school teacher who has no connection with the junior high; 1—Percentage of total enrollment present in cheering section; 2—Participation, sportsmanship, support, enthusiasm, etc.; 3—Each school will give at least three of their own school yells or songs during the intermission between halves; 4—Sportsmanship and courtesy shown visiting team and officials; 5—Support of the home team at all times during game; 6—Amount of enthusiasm and pep shown by the cheer leaders and their respective groups; 7—Cheer and songs will be judged according to originality, rhythm, and volume.

All Junior High School students taking part in the cheering contest should remain at all times on the east side of the field.

Taylor's excellent passing netted one goal, and he also carried the ball on off-tackle plays for consistent gains. Pietz also played a good game for the winning team, accounting for two touchdowns. Cranbrook staged a desperate rally during the last quarter but although they held Pontiac scoreless, were unable to score. The game ended with the play in the center of the field, and Pontiac was able to give all their players a chance to take part in the game.
