Interesting and exciting contacts have seen in several years. The boys played hard but clean. I did not see any flagrant violations of rules. As far as Sawyer's playing is concerned I was confident, after my telephone conversation with Mr. Hart before the game, that a perfect understanding had been reached...

I did not believe we were members of any league or association and therefore sought to comply with no rules other than those we had already established and which I think are fair. We do not restrict the athletic education of any boy in the school. In fact, physical education is part of the curriculum. We insist only upon an age limit and suitable standing in scholarship. We never were questioned by any other teacher...

Dr. W. O. Stevens, headmaster at Cranbrook, said: "We played Birmingham on four different occasions; tennis twice in track once, and a football game with the junior team. We do not play as a member of any league. As far as the track meet last spring is concerned, we merely appealed to the state board for an opinion on the transfer rule, which was waived for us because we have students here from different parts of the country. Certainly there was no understanding about the matter. I understood perfectly that Mr. Hart agreed it was all right to play Sawyer. It's very unfortunate that the affair developed as it did. I enjoyed the game thoroughly and think the best of relationships should exist between the two institutions..."

Forgo the said: "We received in this morning's mail information relative to the affair. We assume it is our prerogative to investigate the matter, whether an official protest is made or not. The climax of the game, perhaps, came in the last period, when Baldwin, making a desperate rally, brought the ball to the Cranbrook 15 yard line. Here Harris, taking the ball on a cross buck, brought the crowd to their feet with a brilliant run around left end, when, pulling himself out of the clutches of 4 tacklers who all but stopped him for a loss, he completed the necessary 20 yards to cross the goal line. The score was 20-19, and there still remained a possibility of being but a mixup on the attempt to run the extra point across ended in confusion and the score stood to the end...
