Branberries, sweet potatoes and Hubbard squash, and celery were the vegetables moving fastest from the food counters into baskets of Birmingham shoppers this week, to make turkey and duck dinners complete.

Sunshine apples, smothered in Florida, twisted, scallopy little and the list for popularity, with their delightful flavor. Summushes are better steamed than boiled, remember. If they are to be little water should be used that is evaporated by the time squash is tender. Cook from 20 to 30 minutes.

Sweet potatoes for Thanksgiving included Nancy Hills, Porto Sweet, Jerseys, and Jersey Seeds.

Smaller sizes in golden-heart celery, furnished by Michigan, sell in Birmingham than some of the larger, brighter stalks from Florida. Home-grown things deserve loyalty.

In cranberries, the firm, fresh Late Reds from Massachusetts, are selling somewhat higher than the Early Blacks, sold more cheaply.

Italian chestnuts for turkey dressing and for after-dinner munch-olled heavily.

For salads on the Thanksgiving menu, a great multitude of tiny shallots from Louisiana were popular for "that certain flavor." Boston lettuce in soft, light heads formed the most beautiful redness and imported French endive was popular. Endive, by the way, is raised in hot weather. Michigan endive arrives on the markets in late December. Tomatoes of beautiful redness and Arkansas, and long-shaped radishes from Missouri intriqued a housewife into buying.

Imported models in fruit included the fancy, purple-blue hothouse from Belgium, fresh pineapples from Cuba, bananas and coconuts from Jamaica in the West Indies, and Messina lemons from California.

Orange and satsumas from Florida, and the new California oranges (cheaper in price this week) craved practically every basket leaving the shops.
