Shell Petroleum Corp. products will be sold at the service station and the most modern facilities for repairing automobiles will be afforded, Mr. Colvin announces. The two new projects are two distinct and separate projects and will be directed by experienced and capable workers, he says. "We intend to begin conservatively," Mr. Colvin declared, "but as business warrants we expect to expand rapidly in the Birmingham territory. We eventually will employ 15 Birmingham men." The manager of the garage will be Mr. J. Atwood, one of the most experienced men in the automotive garage business in this part of the country. Mr. Atwood for several years directed the Chevrolet agency and garage at Commerce, Mich., and during recent years managed one of the largest garages in Chicago. Dr. Colvin has practised in Pontiac for more than 40 years, while Mr. Colvin, who expects to make his permanent home here in Birmingham next Spring, has been engaged in the automotive business for 20 years.
