Library Reports 4,781 Registered

An unusually large number of residents registered at the Baldwin Public Library last month, according to the October report of the library submitted to the library board by Mrs. Nancy B. Thomas. Eighty-seven adults and 22 children registered, bringing the total registration of the library to 4,781.

There were 160 books added during the month, of which 40 were juvenile books. The number of books in the library now is 12,432 at the Adams school, and the 704 at the Pierce School, brought the total circulation of 142 in excess of the total circulation for October a year ago.

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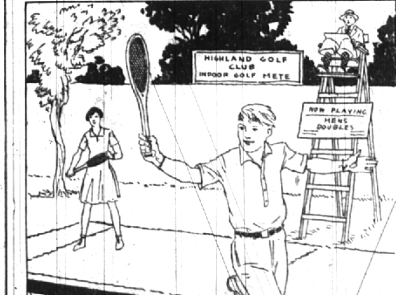
