Birmingham Scares Big Fordson Eleven But Loses Game, 1912

BALDWIN HIGH SCHOOL'S Maroon and White football team threw a scare into Fordson High School Saturday afternoon when in the Fordson stadium they succeeded in scoring 12 points against their opponents, although taking the short end of a 19-12 score.
Fordson, with River Rouge, leads the southern division of the Southeastern Athletic Association, and is one of the strongest teams in the district. Their only loss this year has been to the powerful Jackson eleven which they succeeded in breaking the

Referee Deakin administered penalties to the Fordson team with-out a bit of hesitation, striking 15 steps down the turf five times and giving one five-yard penalty for a total of 80 yards loss on penalties. These penalties were given for holding, unnecessary roughness and interfering with a fair catch. Birmingham lost only five yards on penalties, retaining this one by failing to complete two passes in succession.
Hust Injured
Kenneth Hust, reliable fullback who was one of the scorers against St. Ambrose, twisted his ankle in the first few minutes of play and was replaced by George Shave. John McKee, normally a half-back, also served for the first time this year when in the second half Coach Fangel sent him in to replace Donald Joy and right tackle McKee had a few weeks of practice prior to the game, an ear infection having kept him out. Dale McLellan, veteran center who has been out for several weeks with a "charley horse," played in the game. The same strain kept Tom Moore, who plays either guard or center, out of the game.

Baldwin played inspired football in the second half, holding the Fordson team from pushing them back as they had been doing in the first two periods. Fordson had a considerably heavier and bigger team, but it was unable to gain through Birmingham in the second half of the contest.
With an open date this week to give it time to be whipped into still better shape, the team's chances against Hazel Park, 14 should be good. Neither Hazel Park nor Cranbrook School, the opponent in the League Association, Royal Oak the final opponent in the traditional Thanksgiving Day game, is to be played here this year, having a fairly good season and the Turkey Day classic will provide even more than its customary interest to the spectators of both schools.
Birmingham still has a zero percentage in the League. Cranbrook played three Class A schools out of four League games. Birmingham is just a shade above the requirements for Class C, being rated at present as Class B. Royal Oak will provide an excellent opportunity to rise from the zero place in the average column.

CRANBROOK TEAM BEATS BERKEY HIGH

Shows Power in Last Period, Intercepted Passes Aid in 19-2 Win
DEFENSE IS STRONG
Both in the result and quality of their game, Cranbrook reasserted itself last Friday when it defeated the rival Berkey High School eleven, 19-2. The Blue and Gray attack hammered away throughout the game, and succeeded in putting over two touchdowns in the final period.
Before the game Berkey's High had paraded an excellent record, the field, the presence creating considerable interest as it was the first band to appear in the Cranbrook stadium.
Cranbrook kicked off and the visitors had things their way pretty much throughout the first period. Their first march down the field brought the ball to the 2 yard line where they received a first down. At this critical moment, however, they fumbled and King of Cranbrook recovered the ball. Not long afterwards, however, Berkey took the ball on their own 40 yard line and in a strong advance marked by the fine running of Collins, brought the ball to the 4 yard line as the first period ended.

Held For Down
Cranbrook started the second period with a strong drive of 40 yards, holding Berkey to the 1 yard line for downs. In passing out of danger, however, Fannon of Cranbrook stopped the hand-off of Berkey's 6 yard line and scored 2 points for the visitors. During the contest Cranbrook's defense was able to score, though Berkey again threatened when Mobley rained a long pass which Cranbrook intercepted and brought the ball to the 10 yard line. Strong defense again prevented Berkey, however, and the half ended. Cranbrook unleashed everything they had from the opening whistle of the second half. Lynch kicked to Berkey's 6 yard line and on a succeeding play, Miller intercepted the second half Lynch kicked to Cranbrook the ball in enemy territory. The cheering subsided, however, when it was noted that Cranbrook was off side, and on a succeeding play, the ball still in Berkey's possession. A kick was attempted, but a Cranbrook lineman broke through, blocked it, and fell on the ball.
Here was the Blue and Gray's first opportunity to score, and they made the most of it in short order. Bill Rose, running around left end for 13 yards and carrying the ball over. Shortly afterwards, however, Raymond intercepted Berkey's pass, and the third period ended with the ball in Cranbrook's possession on the visitor's 1 yard line.
It was Berkey's turn to play a sound defense when they now held, holding Cranbrook on their two yard line and kicking out of danger. Cranbrook's attack, however, was never let up, and the Blue and Gray team again brought the ball inside the 20 yard line. Berkey held for the last time, and then sent a spirited rally up the field with two 15 yard runs by Mobley.
