DEBATE CLASS CHANGE MADE

Speeches Will Be Extemporaneous At Baldwin, Coach Announces

According to Mr. H. Earle Corvont, debate instructor at Baldwin high school, this year the method of debate presentation will differ radically from the procedure which contestants for Baldwin have followed in other years. Throughout the debating season none of the debaters will memorize their speeches, he announces.

"Anybody can recite a memorized speech in a word for word manner but one has to have ability to stand before an audience and deliver extemporaneously a speech that will deal constantly with the subject of the debate and pass all tests of English," said Mr. Corvont. "This procedure is inaugurated so that the student who studies debating will make more progress. Striving for naturalness and directness are the aims of this method."

All members of the Baldwin high school debate team selected at the tryouts conducted recently are busy in extensive research work and in practicing every night after school.

Gilbert Hopper, Joseph Huston, and Donald Parry comprise the affirmative team while the other delegation is made up of Marian Masters, Phyllis Huston, Frowbridge Gail and Erin Andrews. The two teams will have a practice debate at Baldwin high school Saturday morning, Oct. 25, and this debate probably will determine the team that will represent Birmingham in the debates scheduled for the winter. The first preliminary debate of the league schedule will be contested Nov. 7. The opponent of Birmingham high school will be announced Oct. 23.

STATE IS SEEKING GAME BIRD DATA

Conservation Dept. Asks That Cards Be Filled Out By Hunters

LANSING, Oct. 16.—In an attempt to obtain more complete information as to local game bird conditions, and as to the success of hunters, the Game Division of the Conservation Department has prepared a bird hunters tally card, and has distributed them to all conservation officers.

Hunters may obtain these tally cards from their local officers or by writing to the Department. At the close of the upland game bird season, the cards should be filled out and sent to the Department's office at Lansing.

While the tally cards ask which counties were hunted in, what days, if any, were used, the bag taken, etc., the most important information asked for is the number of hours each hunter spends in the field and the total number of partridges, prairie chickens or pheasants seen on each hunt. It will take each hunter only a few minutes to supply this information; and he should be glad to give this assistance, as such data is essential to proper game management, and so as to allow the maximum season without undue depletion of birds.

Radio Broadcast Under Sea Today

All the reactions of a man escaping from a sunken submarine will be described for the radio audience this afternoon when the National Broadcasting Company puts on an underwater program from the United States Navy base at New London, Conn.

The program, scheduled to start at three o'clock, Eastern Standard Time will be broadcast during official Navy tests of the newly developed "Momsen Lang," to be used for escape by crews of stricken submarines.
