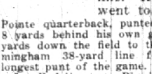

Baldwin and Grosse Pointe Play Scoreless Grid Contest

ALTHOUGH Baldwin High School's football team made eight first downs against three for their opponents at Grosse Pointe Friday, it was unable to prevent the opponents from holding them to a 0-0 tie. Grosse Pointe thus, in a measure, retaliated for a defeat received by them last year.
