

OAKLAND COUNTY NEWS

A second demand by the Rochester village council for \$3,000 from the township of Avon or the return of one-half of the township improvement, highway tax, levied and collected on village property, Monday night. The first demand for the money was made during last June and the township, upon legal advice, took no action on the matter. This request will be submitted to the township board at its next meeting.

The new well at the Athletic field in Rochester will be abandoned. After several weeks of drilling with water found at the 150-foot level, water department officials believe that the 100-gallon per minute production, which the well showed by tests, is insufficient for Rochester's needs and

test wells will be sunk in other locations.

The next meeting of the newly organized North Oakland County Democratic Association will be held Oct. 8 at Rochester, while the West Bloomfield unit of the organization has scheduled a meeting for Oct. 11, it was announced by the club. Voters in Detroit and Hazel Park will vote on the proposed annexation of the latter community to Detroit at the regular elections, Oct. 4, it was announced Saturday by Supervisor Roy Root. Petitions bearing 20,000 signatures have been filed with the secretary of state and officials of Hazel Park and Detroit have placed the proposed annexation question on the ballots. If the combined vote is favorable and Hazel Park approves the measure, the territory will be annexed to Detroit. There are approximately 13,000 persons living in the affected territory bounded by the Eight and Eleven Mile roads and Dequindre road and the city limits of Ferndale and Royal Oak.

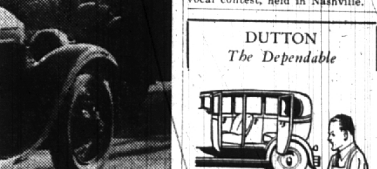
CONSERVATION GROUP MEETS
