# NATURALIST GIVES TALK TO SCOUTS

**Thomas McClure Says Local Troops Fortunate in Possession of Camp George**

Annual life abounds on the premises of Camp George, Birmingham Boy Scout reservation on Lower Long Lake, and Birmingham Scouts are extremely fortunate for this reason if for no other in possessing title to the property, said Thomas McClure, well-known naturalist, in a nature talk before Scouts, parents, and friends in the Community House auditorium Friday evening. He is a descendant of a line of several hundred years of Scotch and English gamekeepers on British estates, and in fact is the first of the line who is not actually practicing gamekeeping.
