Three hundred tickets will be sold for the church supper, which will be served at six o'clock in the parish house, and for which reservations must be made in advance. Several groups are planning to dine together and later to attend the performance of the Village Players. The ticket committee is composed of Mrs. W. G. Hutchinson, chairman, Mrs. W. P. Herdick, and Mrs. Percy Guest, in charge of kitchen arrangements. The sale will continue until the evening, and will be resumed Saturday morning again, continuing throughout the afternoon and evening. Meanwhile, at the Community House, preparations will be under way for the dance, which will be the largest social event of the season in Birmingham this fall.

Miss Rasey To Speak Before University Women On Oct. 31

The lecture scheduled to be given by Miss Rasey at the Baldwin Public Library Friday afternoon, the third of a series on human relations delivered under the auspices of the A. A. U. W., will not be given owing to the inability of Miss Rasey to be in Birmingham. The lectures will be resumed, however, a week from Friday, Oct. 31, at two o'clock. Specific examples of "apathetic" children were given by Miss Rasey in her second lecture Friday. After relating the history and the problem of the child, she asked members of the class to suggest a solution. Discussions followed, and Miss Rasey then stated her theory, in conclusion, general rules of conduct, concerning adult and adolescent relations, were formulated. Miss Rasey called adolescence the time of "divine aliveness."
