The Southern Oakland county international planning and zoning committee took definite action Thursday night at the Royal Oak city hall to present before the state highway commission its recommendation that Livernost avenue be widened and extended from the Detroit city limits north as a state project.

An ordinance regulating and controlling jitneys and providing for certain insurance requirements was passed by the Berkeley village commission Thursday night. The ordinance provides that the jitneys must furnish public liability insurance policies in the limits of \$2,500 and \$5,000.
