AGED MAN HURT IN CAR ACCIDENT

John Kishline, 75, Struck By Auto at Maple and Linden Avenues

Severe lacerations of his left arm and side were suffered Thursday afternoon by John Kishline, 75 years old, 300 Larches road, who was struck by an automobile at West Maple avenue near Linden avenue. Kishline was treated by Dr. C. F. Lawler who reported 40 stitches were necessary to close Kishline's injuries.

According to the police report, Alfred Myers, 315 Chesterfield avenue, was driving west on Maple avenue and attempted to pass a Crowley Milner Co. truck going in the same direction, driven by Louis Balagna, 27 Worcester avenue, Detroit. Balagna, however, started to turn left into Linden avenue, forcing Myers to turn left also, police say.

More than 2,000 essays on fire protection and fire fighting are expected to be received in the near future from school children who competed in the contest during fire prevention week. These essays will be judged and prizes, now on display in Shain's Drug Store, will be awarded the winners of the contest.

STRIKES CYCLIST, MOTORIST FINED

Dexter Man Left Scene After Accident, Court Is Told

Henry Weber, of Dexter, Mich., arrested Oct. 17 for driving his car past a red light signal and colliding with a motorist on a bicycle, was found guilty in the court of Justice Floyd S. Buck Friday afternoon. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$25 and spend 30 days in jail, the jail sentence to be suspended, however, if he replaced the bicycle which was completely destroyed, within 10 days.

The accident occurred at the intersection of Woodward and Oakland avenues, when Weber's car, according to the Birmingham Police, passed the red light signal, and struck Peter Kiewer, 1007 Emmons avenue, driving Woodward avenue. The boy was unhurt, but his bicycle was demolished. Weber waited until a passer-by pulled the boy from beneath the wheels, and then continued on down the street, police say.

Patrolman Robert Appell was given Weber's license by a witness, and arrested Weber. Weber was arrested and arraigned. He pleaded not guilty and was released on personal bond until Friday, the date of the trial. At the trial, he testified on his own behalf, and his wife, who had been with him, testified for him. Three witnesses testified for Kiewer.
