

STUDENTS SET PARADE PLANS

Field Day Program, Nov. 5 Is Rapidly Nearing Completion

Committees have been selected by the eight class presidents of the four upper grades at the Baldwin high school to work on class floats which will be paraded through the village streets on the occasion of the annual Field Day to be held Wednesday, Nov. 5, at the Pierce Athletic field.

The class presidents are: Melvin C. Hart, principal of Baldwin high school, and plans for the parade will be completed by the following program of events to be held at the Pierce Athletic field:

The parade of the floats and students of the various grades will start at 3 p. m. from Baldwin high school and the line of march will extend on Maple avenue to Pierce street, south on Pierce street to the Athletic field at William school.

The judges of the parade are: Mrs. Hirma Bueck, Mrs. William Maywood, and Mr. Clarence Vliet will view the parade at the football field and the winners of the four places will be awarded points.

And Then the Yells

The 50-yard dash for girls and the 100-yard sprint for boys will be the opening features on the program. Pushball and Tug-O-War for girls and boys from all the four upper grades will follow the completion of the dash events. A wheelbarrow race for girls and a horse and rider event for boys meet Tuesday with Mr. Melvin C. Hart principal of Baldwin high school and plans for the parade will be completed by the following program of events to be held at the Pierce Athletic field:

The program will be the cheering contest in this, each class will give three yells. These yells will not be judged on volume alone, but on organization and rhythm.

The following rules have been announced by the committee: 1—The yells for the contest will be awarded upon three things, namely, the float, per cent of class participating, and honorable mention for the most novel costume.

2—Each class must keep together during the contest and all people not participating must remain outside the rope on penalty of forfeiture of the event.

The event will be held under school authority which is vested in the Committee in Charge whose duty is to maintain order. Track, baseball, or football shoes are not allowed on the field.

Engel, boys physical education director at Barnum Junior high school; and head football coach during the absence of Coach George F. Johnson, who is ill, Mr. Frank Whitney, assistant football coach and basketball coach; Mr. Miles Robinson, assistant football coach and manual arts instructor at the Baldwin high school; Melvin C. Hart, principal of Baldwin high school; Class presidents.

BALDWIN TRIO R. O. HARRIERS PRACTICES FOR BEAT BALDWIN FIRST DEBATE

Orators Train For Opening Contest With Ann Arbor, Nov. 7

FACE OTHER SCHOOLS

In preparation for the first league debate of the preliminary series of the Michigan High School Debating League to be held with Ann Arbor high school at the University city next Friday evening Nov. 7, the Baldwin high school debating trio has been busy for the past week in practice debates held with schools in the vicinity immediately surrounding Birmingham.

H. Earle Corvolet, coach of the Baldwin trio, Phyllis Huston, Troubridge Galt, and Joseph Huston, has communicated with Miss Ethel B. Eisehart, the Ann Arbor coach, concerning the selection of the judges for the contest. Mr. Corvolet has not yet received word concerning the final men selected to judge at the debate which will see the Birmingham trio upholding the negative side of the question: "Resolved, that National Chain Grocery Stores operating in the State of Michigan are detrimental to the people of the state." The date of the event which is scheduled for Friday may be changed to Thursday or Saturday evenings if the Ann Arbor trio has other activities for Friday night.

Oppose Rochester

The Rochester affirmative team journeyed to the Baldwin high school Thursday to offer the first practice debate to the Baldwin squad. Monday afternoon the Maroon and White speakers went to the Detroit Central high school for another "sharpening up" contest. The last of the practice runs will be held next Tuesday with Cooley High school of Detroit, there. This is the school whose debating squad last year eliminated the Baldwin high school trio after they had successfully won all of the four preliminary trials.

The debate at Ann Arbor high school next week will mark the first time that any Baldwin high school debating team has ever debated temporarily on a subject not previously debated. This plan was instituted this year at Baldwin high school by Coach H. Earle Corvolet and will be tested "under fire" in the contest at the University city.

Meanwhile, the other four members of the Baldwin high school debating squad are continuing their work on debate in the hope of participating in future contests that are scheduled following the Ann Arbor trial.

PONTIAC JUNIOR HIGH VICTORIOUS

Defeat Cranbrook Younger Squad 12 to 0; It Latter's First Loss

Porter making two spectacular runs which brought the ball to Cranbrook's 4 yard line when the half ended.

Runs 25 Yards

During the third quarter Pontiac showed clearly their advantage. Cranbrook making only sporadic gains. Shortly before the end of the period the second score was made when Justin of Pontiac ran 25 yards directly through the Cranbrook team for a touchdown. In attempting to carry the ball over for the extra point, however, he was thrown for a loss. Dorr, Cranbrook quarterback, was taken from the field with a sprained ankle. Soon after, the game ended with the ball in Cranbrook territory.
