Bees Need Packing To Survive Winter EAST LANSING, Oct. 30.—The protection of bees in Michigan apartures from winter winds and low temperatures by the use of wind breaks around the beehives and by packing the hives either with wood or straw bales is recommended by specialists in apiculture at Michigan State College. Bushy shrubs, evergreens, or groups of buildings can be utilized as windbreaks and should be on the north and west sides of the colonies of bees. When no natural windbreak is available, a board fence six to nine feet high built with boards spaced two inches apart will give ample protection from winds. In average Michigan winter temperatures packed hives will be in enough better condition in the spring to expect them to produce one more super of honey than the unpacked bees.
