POSTMEN FIND DIFFICULTIES IN MAIL DELIVERY

More than 800 houses in Birmingham have incorrect or confusing numbers, according to a report of postoffice officials who urge home owners to change their numbers to conform with the village plan adopted in 1929.

Letter carriers have experienced difficulties in the past year because many houses have carried both the old and new numbers. There are approximately 500 houses so improperly numbered, postal authorities say. About 150 houses have only the old numbers and another 150 have no identification numbers, it is reported.
It is the hope of postal authorities that home owners who have not placed the new numbering system on their homes and thrown away the old numbers, will do so as soon as possible to avoid confusion and delay of mail during the Christmas rush season. Information on the house numbering system can be obtained from the village engineering department in the Municipal Building.

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
